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BACK TO SCHOOL MEANS...

- Changes in schedules/routines
- Meeting new teachers/peers
- Learning new things every day
- Managing new responsibilities

This can be stressful for kids and caregivers alike! Many children have difficulty adjusting to these changes, and may need extra help when learning new skills related to fine/gross motor skills, emotional regulation, cognitive skills, and learning how to play/communicate with others. That's where our therapy team can help!



WHAT YOU CAN DO...

Here are some strategies that can help kids and caregivers adjust to new routines, and increase emotional wellbeing for you both.

- Incorporate daily moments of connection with your child such as having dinner together, reading books together, or playing a game.
- Establish a predictable routine that is easy for kids to remember.
- Use timers/give a countdown to help your child prepare for transitions.
- For sensory seekers, having a few minutes to jump, swing, or crawl after school can help with regulation. For sensory avoiders, having dim lighting or using a weighted blanket can be beneficial.
- Reduce screentime as bedtime approaches.



If your child has a disability and you feel they need extra support in addition to outpatient services, they may qualify for a 504 Plan or an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) through their school.

Remember, you know your child best!



Talk to your school team to see if your child is eligible for a 504 Plan or IEP. Processes may vary in different schools/districts.



A 504 Plan offers accommodations to the environment such as permission to use noise-cancelling headphones, note-taking support, or more frequent breaks. An IEP offers accommodations <u>and</u> modifications to assignments or the curriculum based on your child's needs.



Both are legal documents that follow your child through their time in school and are offered at no cost to parents. Starting a new school year may also be a time when parents and teachers can identify possibile language delays. A language delay could be the reason some children struggle more in the new school year.

Alyssa DeRoos, part of the speech team here at Zenith Rehabilitation, offers the following guidance for identifying signs of a receptive vs. an expressive language delay.

RECEPTIVE LANGUAGE (HOW WELL A CHILD UNDERSTANDS AND REMEMBERS WHAT IS SAID TO THEM)

- Difficulty answering questions
- Prefers independent play vs cooperative play
- Not showing interest in books
- Needing a lot of repetition to remember information
- Difficulty following directions that have two or more steps (ex: Take off your shoes and put them in the cabinet)

VS

EXPRESSIVE LANGUAGE (WHAT THE CHILD CAN SAY AND HOW IT IS SAID)

- Trouble retelling a story or events from their day.
- Difficulty using plurals, past tense, or pronouns in sentences.
- Using generic or non-specific words like "this" or "that" to label or request items.
- Preferring to use gestures or non-vocal communication (pointing to what they want instead of verbally stating it)
